First things first: We cannot thank our teachers and staff in Morton District 709 enough for their ongoing effort, perseverance and unrelenting optimism in overcoming so many challenges this school year.

Our students are learning, and they are healthier than perhaps we had any right to expect, in no small way because of the employees whom we count among our

many blessings this holiday season. May a deservingly restful and special Thanksgiving be yours.

Indeed, as we enter the holiday season, we are grateful that our COVID-19 and quarantine numbers have stayed relatively even or continued to decline even as they've climbed, unfortunately, outside our classroom doors.

As of today, 11 students were absent due to a COVID-19 diagnosis, compared to nine entering this past weekend and to a school-year high of 31 at the beginning of November. Our quarantines were at 185, down from 240 just a few days ago and from a 2020 peak of 348 on Nov. 5. Approximately 80 students are expected to return Monday, Nov. 30, including nine who'd previously tested positive.

The number of staff members out with a positive test decreased to one from four, with quarantines at 18, a drop from 24.

As we have indicated before, we remain committed to in-person learning with our students and staff as they return next week and as we begin the second semester

following Christmas break. As such, now is no time to let down our guard.

The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) has developed some tips on how to <u>celebrate Thanksgiving safely</u>, but in short, enjoy this time with family but please mask up when you're out and about, keep a prudent distance, and be smart in your interactions, which added together equal being safe as we march forward.
