Morton District 709 Weekly Update

Consistent with what's happening in the community outside our school doors, COVID diagnoses and quarantines jumped this past week, though they remain at levels that fall well short of alarm.

As of Friday, 17 students had been diagnosed with COVID-19, up from 11 on April 9, with 188 in quarantine relative to 50 last week. One staff member was positive,

compared to three the week before, with eight in at-home isolation, up from six last week.

There have been sharp increases in COVID-19 cases in the Peoria metro region, which includes Tazewell County at an 11 percent positivity rate, launching the area into the top 10 in the nation.

"Exposures have been related to out-of-school activities like sports, dance, sleepovers, as well as gatherings with friends," the Peoria City/County Health Department told the <u>Journal Star</u> this past week. "With summer coming on, people gathering, and businesses reopening, we encourage residents to do what helped us from the beginning of the pandemic – when out in public and around

people who have not been vaccinated, wear face masks, social distance, use good hand hygiene, and get vaccinated when you can."

As a result of the spike, the state has dispatched more vaccines to this area.

On that latter front, the Tazewell County Health Department announced Friday

that it will be offering Pfizer vaccines to students age 16 and older from 8:45 a.m. to 3:45 p.m. on Monday, April 26, and on Monday, May 3. The second dose follow-ups will be 21 days later — on May 17 and May 24, respectively. Only Pfizer is available to teens.

The injections will be administered at the health department's clinic at 1800 Broadway Road in Pekin. A parent or legal guardian must provide signed written consent for anyone under 18.

Appointments are required, and can be made <u>here</u>.

Meanwhile, COVID concerns have prompted the postponement of Morton High School's livestream performance of "Shrek, the Musical" until next month. The shows will now be at 7 p.m. Friday and Saturday, May 7-8. Tickets are available here.
